Background to the AFAAS Week

Founded in 2004 as an autonomous body, the African Forum for Agricultural Advisory Services (AFAAS) is a continental platform for mutual learning and innovation among agricultural extension and advisory services providers across Africa.

From its inception, AFAAS has aligned itself with CAADP Pillar IV (technology generation, dissemination, adoption and training). Through this alignment, AFAAS has been contributing to the African Union's goal of delivering an average growth rate of 6% GDP.

Cognisant of the fact that the African Union Commission (AUC) has recommitted itself to enhancing CAADP momentum based on the Malabo Declaration of June 2014 (which emphasises accelerating agricultural growth and transformation for shared prosperity and improved livelihoods), AFAAS is reaffirming its partnership with the AUC in translating the commitments of the Malabo Declaration into results. In particular, AFAAS is seeking to play a pivotal role in enhancing the utilisation and adoption of: productivity enhancing technologies; value adding processes; and post-harvest loss reducing practices - largely among smallholder producers.

AFAAS held its first Africa Wide Agricultural Extension Week in Gaborone, Botswana in August 2013, which brought together over three hundred delegates from more than forty countries within and outside Africa. The delegates underscored the fact that Africa faced key challenges in agricultural productivity because farmers did not get optimal value for their efforts and from their land potential. Some of the key factors causing this include, among others, the unfavourable policy environment, low capacities, inadequate delivery systems, limited approaches and usage of tools like ICTs to enable effective extension and advisory services delivery. These inform the theme of this 2nd African Agricultural Extension Week 2015.

Theme of the Week

“Reinvigorating Extension Services for Market-led Agriculture within the Context of the Malabo Declaration”.

Technical Tour 1: Agro-Processing and ICT

Site: Digital Green Ethiopia and Genesis Private Farm in Adaa District

Adaa/Deberzeit are located 50 km away from Addis Ababa. The sites to be visited are:

- The Digital Green approach, in Ethiopia, screens low-cost, localized videos on a village level to development groups comprised of 25-30 members. Within Adea district, 2,500 farmers are currently engaged with localized video content. Ten villages were piloted in Adea and Digital Green, in close collaboration with the FMoA aims to reach at least 1 million farmers through its video-based extension approach in partnership with other ICT-enabled services. During the field visit, visitors will attend a video dissemination in one of the ten villages in Adea district.
- With the partnership of Double Harvest America and Double Harvest Netherlands, Genesis Farms was started in November of 1996 for the purpose of demonstrating large scale, integrated agricultural production. Genesis Farms grows more than 20 varieties of vegetables and harvests 10,000 kilogram of produce weekly. The dairybarn is fully occupied with 80 cows providing milk for the processing plant. Genesis Farms' butter, cheese, and yogurt are market leaders in quality and taste.

Genesis Farms' internship program provides hands-on training to men and women from all over Africa. Currently, the work force numbers 450 people led by General Manager and Ethiopian partner, Behailu Wolde. In 2013, Behailu Wolde became the full owner of Genesis Farms.

Technical Tour 2: Post Harvest Handling and Marketing

Site: The Ethiopia Commodity Exchange, (ECX) and Oromia Coffee Farmers' Cooperative Union (OCFCU) Limited Liability in Gelan District

Gelan district is located at 30 km away from Addis Ababa. The sites to be visited are:

- **The Ethiopia Commodity Exchange, (ECX):** is a marketplace, where buyers and sellers come together to trade, assured of quality, delivery and payment. The Ethiopia Commodity Exchange (ECX) commenced trading operations in April 2008. The vision of ECX is to transform the Ethiopian economy by becoming a global commodity market of choice. ECX's mission is to connect all buyers and sellers in an efficient, reliable, and transparent market by harnessing innovation and technology, and based on continuous learning, fairness, and commitment to excellence.



The ECX is a unique partnership of market actors, the Members of the Exchange, and its main promoter, the Government of Ethiopia. ECX represents the future of Ethiopia, bringing integrity, security, and efficiency to the market. The Ethiopian Commodity Exchange was started to benefit and modernize the way Ethiopia was trading its most valuable assets, its commodities.

- **Oromia Coffee Farmers' Cooperative Union (OCFCU) Limited Liability:** OCFCU is a small farmer's owned cooperative union. OCFCU was established in June 1, 1999 and works exclusively in Oromia Regional State, which accounts for more than 65 % of the country's total coffee growing land. Members of Oromia Coffee Farmers' Cooperative Union are the growers, processors and suppliers of high quality, organic Arabica coffee for the direct export. OCFCU exports traceable, fair trade, organic, UTZ, and Rain Forest Alliance certified coffees. OCFCU now have a cupping lab for quality control located at its office and have massive central facility for technical, financial, administrative and also high tech processing facility with capacity of 57 tonnes per hour. The processing facility has created a job for more than 1,200 Seasonal employees. OCFCU have recently created its own members bank which is one of the greatest benefits to its own members for the much needed pre-harvest financing. They also provide their farmers with insurance options to cover coffee against loss.

Technical Tour 3: Capacity Development and Mechanization

Ginchi district is located 80 km away from Addis Ababa. The sites to be visited are:

- **Farmer Training Centers (FTCs)** are one of the government mechanisms that has been put in place since 2004 in order to ensure agricultural extension service reaches farmers efficiently and effectively. Farmers. The Government of Ethiopia (GoE) has plans to establish 18,000 FTC throughout the country and currently, there are 10,148 functional and active FTCs in the country. The major purpose of FTCs are to: provide comprehensive agricultural extension service through demonstration; produce knowledgeable and skilled farmers that can efficiently carry out agricultural activities; and produce young farmers with agricultural capability by providing training to young farmers who completed primary education. FTCs provide training programs to both literate and illiterate farmers at the completion of



which 'Green certificate' will be awarded to participants. FTCs also function as agricultural information centers that provides information on market prices, quality standards of marketable products, inputs supply & distribution, and weather conditions to farmers. One of these FTCs is Ginchi FTC, which established in 2008.

- **The Ethio-China Agricultural Technology Demonstration Center** is a demonstration center funded by Chinese Government and has been operated by the Chinese technical team and Ministry of Agriculture since its establishment in 2012. It has a total area coverage of 52.36 ha in Ginchi town, Dendi Wereda, Oromia Region. The main advisory services provided through this center are: Applied research and demonstrations of different agricultural technologies, recycling of agricultural materials using various techniques, and providing hands on training courses for agricultural technicians, students and farmers.

- **Dendi District Cluster Farming:** A group of farmers working closely with extension workers and researchers on adaptation and seed multiplication of different crops.
